In 2019, 77% of **Hubbard County students** agreed that drinking alcohol is NEVER a good thing for teens to do!

Compared to 72% in 2013

#### **VISION**

A united community where children can prosper and grow into healthy adults.

#### **MISSION**

To reduce and prevent alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use among the youth of Hubbard County.

#### **POSITIVE NORMS**

It's true, student surveys indicate that MOST students are choosing NOT to use alcohol and other drugs...including marijuana and vaping.

> These surveys also show that MOST students and adults misperceive this norm and believe that students drink and use other drugs at a much higher rate than they actually do.

Misperceived norms are a risk factor for participating in harmful behavior. Research shows that if students believe that most other students are using, they are more likely to use themselves.

We use messages like these to help correct misperceptions and increase health in our communities.



#### **ACES MN SUMMIT**

The first-ever ACEs MN Summit, "Healing Begins at the Headwaters" was held on February 13, 2019. The goal was to help build awareness in becoming a community that is trauma informed and to grow resilience for generations to come. Our community is coming together to address and work to prevent adverse childhood experiences. The event was a huge success. There were over 400 attendees from various agencies in and around our community.

This Summit directly benefitted area educators, health care providers, law enforcement, parents, business owners, students, community members, the faith community, mental health service providers, social service providers, senior citizens, and more.

# FACTS & IMPACT

**Hubbard County's** 2019 ACEs Summit drew over 400 participants. 98% found the information presented useful and 95% would attend a future ACEs Summit.

The percentage of Hubbard County students reporting they bought alcohol from a bar, restaurant, or store decreased from 12% in 2013 to 1% in 2019. (among youth reporting past-month alcohol use)

#### 410 People

have received **Responsible Beverage Server Training** in Hubbard County.

# THERE'S MORE WORK TO DO!

Youth access to alcohol has been significantly reduced through partnerships between businesses, employees, and Law Enforcement.

In 2019, Hubbard County students reported rates of past-month alcohol use that were higher than the state average [20% vs. 13%].

They also reported higher rates of tobacco use: 21<u>% vs. 18%.</u>

1 in 3 Hubbard County students who reported

past month alcohol use said they got alcohol

from their parents. Statewide, it was closer to 1 in 5.

Tobacco use had been declining among Hubbard County students, but vaping has reversed that trend.

1 in 3 Hubbard County students have experienced two or more Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). The percentage of students reporting past month marijuana use increases with the number of ACEs experienced.

However, feeling that adults in the community care buffered that risk. Among youth with one or more ACEs, those who feel adults in the community care about them were half as likely to report marijuana use: 8% vs 15%.
